Critical Mass was a big part of the Birmingham 2022 Festival and the Commonwealth Games.




**Inclusive** means to make sure that nobody is left out.

#### **Festival Model**



Large and small groups could ask for money for projects.

The aim was to fill Birmingham with art and events.

The local community and artists worked together.

Critical Mass was inclusive dance project.



It was **high-profile**.

**High profile** means it got a lot of attention.



There were hundreds of **participants** that took part.

**Participant** means someone who gets involved in an activity.



The people who took part were aged 16 - 30 years old.

**Participants** were from the West Midlands.



They **represented** the **diversity** of the region.



**Represented** means to be doing something on behalf of another person or group.

**Diversity** means the differences between people.



Critical Mass wanted to change the way that people

did **meaningful inclusion** for big events.

#### Critical Mass in numbers.

2242 people took part in 16 weekly sessions.



The sessions were held in different places and online.

Participants were all aged between 16 and 30 years old.



There were 22 members of staff & 12 support workers.

There were 15 **freelance** artists.



45% of people had a disability

were neurodiverse



a long term health issue.



Neurodiverse means people who experience the world around them in many different ways.

Freelance means someone who works for themselves but who will have been paid to do jobs at the Festival.



#### Critical Mass in numbers.


66% of participants said they will carry on dancing.



They said this because they had done **Critical Mass**.



22,048 people watched Critical Mass perform live



All of those in the audience attended in person.

100% of participants were from the West Midlands.



91% joined to be part of the Commonwealth Games.





89% said the biggest difference made was meeting new people and making new friends.

Participants said they felt happy and less anxious while taking part.

#### Outcome 1 - Summary of learning.

Participants wellbeing was improved by taking part.



**Critical Mass** improved participants

physical health and wellbeing.



There were times when **participants** were very tired.

Or they became stressed.



Plans were made so that participant wait times were lower.

It is important to plan for these things happening.



Staff had mental health first aid training.



First Aid staff were available if needed.

Time and space was made for participants to use if they felt anxious or emotional.

#### Outcome 2 - Summary of learning.

Participants feel they belong and connect at big events.



Critical Mass made people feel like they belonged.



Participants also felt connected.

This was because **participants** became closer at weekly sessions.



They experienced feeling of togetherness by taking part in the big event.



The online group was also successful in connecting people.

Social media was used by many to keep in touch.



But some said that online contact did not last or become in person friendships.




Only 49% of participants felt they had connected with the wider community.

Dancing and performing with lots of other people brought participants together.



#### Outcome 3 - Summary of learning.

Challenge wider views of disability and impairment.



**Critical Mass** was successful at working with a wide range of people.

The project beat its target by reaching 45% of participants with disabilities.

28% had lots of experience working with people with disabilities.



30% of these people also had a disability themselves.

Over 70% of people did not normally work with people who have disabilities.



60% of people said that the project helped them to understand and views of people with disabilities.

A plan was put into place to support participants.



The project talked about access and any changes that would need to happen so people could take part.

Staff and participants cared for and about one another.



The project was successful in being **inclusive** and creating a big performance. Everyone was proud.

Wider changes need to happen so this success continues in the future.

#### Outcome 4 - Summary of learning.

Have high quality local inclusive dance now and future.



**Critical Mass** was made with a clear plan of what it wanted to achieve.

The project had ideas that had worked before.

**Critical Mass** was supported by a single funder, who believed in its ambition..



More could have been done to involve people with disabilities

and parents or carers when the project was being made.

The team that were in charge had lots of skills.



However there was no one in charge of access.

This meant that access help was done by staff with other jobs.



80% of staff said they got new skills from **Critical Mass**.

Staff plan to do more inclusive dance projects in future.



84% thought inclusive dance was stronger in the West Midlands because of **Critical Mass**.

Staff and participants enjoyed creating together.

The way the project was designed made the most of **inclusive** practice.

# The information you need to know to understand something.



Critical Mass put 3 things together.

1. Volunteering at mega events



**Volunteer** means to spend your time helping others.

A mega event is a big show with lots of people.

2. Creative mass participation.



Mass means a large quantity or number.

3. Inclusive dance.



Volunteers help a lot at big events.

People with disabilities face lots of **barriers**.



A **barrier** means is an issue or reason that stops you from doing something.

The London 2012 Olympic and Paralympic Games made a lot of progress.



Volunteers with disabilities were recruited. 5% in total.

Many of those volunteers felt they had an access need but not a disability.

This suggests that people with a high level of needs did not apply.



### Context

There were 2 challenges for **Critical Mass**.



- 1. Remove barriers for participation for people with disabilities.
- 2. To recruit 35% of participants who said they

have a disability





have a long term health issue.



**Critical Mass** asked how they could get an **inclusive** cast.

They wanted to do this at a mega event with mass participation.

Critical Mass made opportunities for this to happen.



**Inclusive** dance welcomes everyone.

It challenges the idea of the body you need to dance.

It celebrates dancing in new and different ways.



**Critical Mass** brought a **diverse** group together.

They showed anyone could take part in a

mass participation mega event.

FABRIC's job was to find, train and manage staff.

FABRIC led on recruiting a diverse group of participants.

FABRIC had to make sure that communications were inclusive.



FABRIC were responsible for the opening event.

Arts Connect helped connect to local schools and communities.

They also helped to support other groups and providers.

They provided advice for Critical Mass.



They will have an important role in helping **Critical Mass** to have a lasting impact.



Dance Development Leaders Group is a network of 70 members who develop dance **participation**.

Spirit of 2012 Trust funded the project.



**Funded** means to provide money for a project.

**Critical Mass** used Spirit of 2012 Trust's learning and experience from the London Games.





### Critical Mass and D-Design Timeline





A suggestion about what should be done.

Ideas for future projects like **Critical Mass**.



Use the ideas and experiences of people with disabilities when designing a project.

Make sure to include parents and carers too.



Artists should take part in the design of a project also.

Make sure the local community has been included.



You need to know who can help connect and get a project started in the local area.

Get lots of information about access needs.

Set a date to have got all of the access information by.



This will make sure that plans and money are in place for access.



Make sure that consent forms and emergency contacts have been collected.

Produce easy read guidelines for participants.

This will help **participants** make choices about taking part and keep them coming.



Have digital taster sessions at the start of the project.

This will help reach more people and help access.



A suggestion about what should be done.



Have a team and try to make it the same people.

Make sure people the team knows what their jobs are.

Check the team know when jobs need to be done by.

Recruit Dance Leaders from different backgrounds.

Offer **meaningful** chances to progress.

Share important dates to the right people.

Share these dates as early as you can.

Think about using other artists to lead.

Sharing the work can lower stress and pressure.



Having different leads can also make the project different.

Make time to introduce everyone to one another.





**Disability Confident** is a government scheme

It encourages employers to recruit people with a disability or health conditions.

Have a person whose job it is to oversee access.

Meet the team often and check how the project is going.





A suggestion about what should be done.



Make sure to check the quality of sessions.

This is important if sessions are in different places.

Be clear on what people can do and what you expect.



Spend time with the artistic team to understand what they are doing.

Make sure the artistic team spends time with people who are helping from outside the project.



Give **participants** the chance to create with Dance Leaders.

Make sure that anyone telling others about the project does so in the right way



Take film and photos of activity and share them as they happen.

Use captions on videos.



Use easy read and make sure other languages are available.

Use a British Sign Language interpreter.

This will help make the project more inclusive.



When the project is ending think about how this might affect **participants**.

Speak to people who may be doing similar work so that the projects effects can last.



A suggestion about what should be done.

Be sure to think about what happens after the project end when looking at how it went.



Include participants and the team when thinking about what can happen after the project ends.



Working in an **inclusive** way needs to be more understood.

It takes more than one project to do this.



If doing a mega event everyone should be working at the same time, to the same date.

Staff who are paid should be happy to be led by **volunteers**.



People with disabilities should be shown in the right way.

This area still needs lots of work.

Staff who are writing stories for the press or on social media should know about this.



Be sure to share things you learn with others.

Make sure that you are happy to learn from others.



Have respect for what volunteers offer.

There are plans for a book that will share our recommendations.

This book will be for others to use and learn from.



# Conclusion

Mental barriers are often made by us.

We all need to think differently to change this.



Critical Mass helped people to meet one another.

It helped participants find out who they are.



It helped participants to know what they could do.

It changed the views of others towards participants.

People could share their ideas and be creative.




